## Panel 3C: Neurodivergent Humanities: Network Panel

This panel introduces the ongoing work and future vision of the Neurodivergent Humanities Network, with a particular focus on inclusive research practices in the humanities for 2025–2026. It will spotlight key initiatives—such as our mentorship programme—and highlight recent research developed by members in response to the Congress' overarching theme.

The session will open with reflections from the inaugural cohort of our mentorship scheme. Dr Abs S. Ashley and Meg Fereday will speak about their collaboration, sharing insights into the value of navigating academic life through neurodivergent ways of processing, relating, and creating. Following this, network co-leads Dr. Daniel P. Jones and Dr. Nicola Simonetti will present examples of current research taking place within the network. Dr. Jones will discuss KLAZO, a 20-minute theatrical piece

exploring the experience of living with Tourette Syndrome, offering it as an artistic method for translating embodied experience into performance. Dr. Simonetti will present on collaborative authorship among neurodiverse writers, framing it as a dynamic and responsive mode for (re)creating neurodivergent experiences in literature. The panel will conclude with an open Q&A session, inviting attendees to engage with the presenters and contribute to the broader conversation around neurodivergent research practices and futures.
